• A major change was made to the Alumni Website when, in early September, the Membership Directory, the Messengers Directory, and the Calendar, as well as all pages linked to from these pages, were password protected. This was done for two reasons. The first was to protect the information contained within the directories from automated email address "harvester" programs. These programs search the internet for pages with email addresses on them and collect them so that they might be sold to SPAMmers. We managed to get very lucky and never got hit by one of these. However, it was decided that we should no longer take the chance.

A second reason for the password protection was to protect personal information (such as birthdates and addresses) from those who might use it for sinister purposes. Related to this was the concern that pictures of members or their children might attract unsavory elements.

To gain access, please use the following when prompted - User name: "Tau"; Password: "ElmsClub". Don't include the quotes and note that both are case sensitive. 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Letters From the Front

Last in the series, excerpts from emails sent in by 2^{nd} Lt. George Johnson (00) who was assigned to the DMZ in Korea until the beginning of July.

June 27, 2002

We had the craziest damned riot down at Camp Red Cloud (CRC) last night. Located in Uijongbu (a town mentioned often in the TV show MASH) CRC is the headquarters to my division, the 2nd Infantry Division.

There was a protest planned outside CRC previously (involving the accident at Twin Bridges where the two girls were killed by an American vehicle) and we already had one of our companies, C CO, down there to bolster the MPs. Then the Koreans lost their semi-finals game. Many unhappy people swelled the ranks of the protesters, and it turned from protest to riot. The Korean riot police could not hold them back. The wire at CRC was breached in numerous places and rioters poured onto post setting things on fire (according to reports we were getting it now seems the damage was not as bad as feared).

At this point the DIV commander deemed reinforcements necessary and personally requested Currahees. 2-2 Aviation was ordered to provide birds to Air Assault A & B Companies onto the CRC Golf Course and from there link up with C CO and the MP detachment.

We had just left work and were chillin' in the hooch, I had not even removed my BDUs when one of the LTs came running in and said we were recalled and the short version of what was going on. We ran down to headquarters and started setting up the Pick-up Zones (PZs) for the birds. It was amazing how fast we set them up, right on time B CO started showing up in full battle rattle. They broke themselves into chalks and started doing manifests (very important, we need to know who is on what bird in case one goes down and they are charred beyond recognition). We were ready when the birds arrived and off went B CO. We had to truck A CO up from Camp Giant but they were ready when their lift arrived.

We don't know much now what went on, but that is quiet now and aside from minor injuries (bruises and abrasions) all our personnel are safe.

This all leads into a discussion of the Korean concept of justice. Why were so many people upset about the accident? I know people were killed but that is not the whole reason it blew up. They were really mad because the army would not allow the soldier to be tried in Korean courts. There is a reason for this. Strange as it sounds the Korean justice system follows the beliefs of many Koreans which is, "punishment is based on the incident not the circumstances or intent." I talked to Koreans who asked, "Why he not going to jail?" They would not accept that if his intention was not to harm, and if he did nothing wrong, it was just a freak of chance, he should not be punished. They seem to believe that when an incident happens of a certain type, there must be a punishment. There is no justifiable homicide, killing in self-defense or the like. If you kill someone, you have to be tried for murder and sent to jail, because a man died. It does

not matter that the man was trying to hit you with a lead pipe or something. It's a flat penalty no matter the circumstances. In my opinion, that is messed up. First of all that attitude should preclude war in general as war is based on the concept that under certain circumstance killing is necessary and even justifiable. The pitfalls of cultural collisions I suppose. The other thing to remember is that rioting and protests are part of the Korean psyche. They have a very high rate of college students who make up the majority of the protestors.

So as always the Currahees are holding the line on The DMZ and at CRC now.

July 19, 2002

The monsoons are back, it rained for all of yesterday, just pissed rain all day. But monsoon proper means I am coming home since I got here in the monsoons.

In four days I sign out of my BN and 24 hours after that I board my plane back to the US.

It has been a strange and interesting year. I lived on the DMZ in a Quonset hut that made the dorm at Ripon look positively fancy. I got to meet former president Carter and shake his hand. I went to Air Assault school and got to rappel from a hovering helicopter. I have been woken in the night by the siren, not knowing if it was another drill or if the NK horde was coming. In training I flew as the S-3's radio operator in two air assaults. I have written SOPs for the BN, coordinated training events, done reports, run tear gas and small arms ranges.

I have visited palaces, old battlefields, eaten dog and met people from all over the world. I have purchased a lot of DVDs and CDs. Read a lot of books.

I have met a lot of awesome people. People I plan to keep in touch with even after I leave this place. When you are on a post as remote and inaccessible as Camp Greaves you become close to people. There are no families here, no where to go off post without a long bus ride. You get to know everyone in the BN. Bar-B-Ques, eating at the NOTRI and listening to a band, or just chillin' and watching a movie you spend time with the other people in the BN. When they have problems you hear about it, when good things happen you hear about it.

I think in terms of bus schedules and formations and leaving numbers of where I can be reached at all times. I think of a trip to the PX as an all day affair, I can't cook here and the commissary is an all day trip anyway. It will be a big adjustment coming home.

I will not miss Camp Greaves nor the hassle and jump through your ass work, but I will miss the people and the feeling of family here.

Next time I email I will be stateside. CURRAHEE! George
