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## Challenge Coins

### **New Tradition**

The tradition of challenge coins is derived from a military tradition in which members of a unit are issued with a token of membership. When a fellow member of the unit displays their coin to another, that "challenged" person must meet the challenge by producing their own coin. If they cannot, they must buy the challenger a drink.

Challenge coins have found their way into many civilian organizations, including fraternities, sororities, clubs, etc.

Pete Lenz (89) suggested the idea of a challenge coin on the alumni exploder and then used email as well as a couple of custom-made web surveys to poll alumni with regard to level of interest and then to design the coin.

A large group of alumni designed a coin that reflects the house of the past 30 years, an excellent idea since this is the 30th anniversary of post-Nu Tau. The coin is a silver colored alloy, 1.75" in diameter.

One side of the coin (see image to the left) bears the house name, the crest of the house in 1976 (when we reformed after Sigma Nu left) and the three important dates in Taus's history: It's founding, its refounding, and the year it went co-ed.

The flip side of the coin (right) bears the current crest of the house along with the five virtues represented by the five stars that have always adorned the crest.

#### Coins for new members

This spring a new tradition was started at Activation: the gifting of a Theta Sigma Tau Challenge Coin to each newly activated member.

Because of the number of donations received, every active member and every activated pledge this spring received a coin as a gift to them from the alumni. Additionally, there are enough remaining donor coins to ensure that the next several pledge classes also receive a coin upon activation.

These donated coins will eventually run out, but the house is discussing various ways in which the house itself can continue to fund coins for new members so that, from this year forward, every member receives a coin when they are activated.

### THE ALUMNI NEWSLETTER

For the last 15 or so years this newsletter has been published at irregular intervals in order to keep people in touch with each other and the house as well as to entertain and annoy. However, the alumni newsletter has not always been as it is now.

The first edition of what evolved into this newsletter was a joke, a three page newsletter concocted in 1989 by Pete Lenz (89) and Carol Shay (88) while they sampled the new and passing fad of "dry" beers.

As their conversation meandered, they fell to talking about the house and the fact that the house had not published a newsletter for the past couple years. Prior to this, it had been a tradition for the house to mail a newsletter to its alumni detailing their activities and accomplishments. But this tradition seemed to have fallen by the way. So Carol and Pete decided to make up their own, filled with completely fabricated "class notes," news, and a song making fun of Summer Party.

Following the acclaim and excitement this Alumni<sup>2</sup> Newsletter caused (i.e.: none at all) the idea lay dormant for a while.

In 1991 Pete revived the alumni newsletter, mainly because he had moved to Massachusetts and wanted to stay in touch with the Taus back home. So, he would gather together what information and material he could and publish a newsletter every three months. Sometimes they were rather sparsely populated with information, other times they were bursting with news and fun.

In 1995, having moved back to Wisconsin for grad school and suddenly having access to the world wide web and the ability to make a website, Pete started working on the alumni site as a supplement to the newsletter, a situation that has now reversed.

Up until 2002 the newsletter was mailed free to any alumni for whom Pete had a snail mail address. But, sadly, as expenses went up and the number of alumni grew, the cost of printing and mailing 150+ newsletters became prohibitive. So the free version of the newsletter went to "webonly" status: upon completion, an Adobe Acrobat file of the newsletter is posted for free download to the alumni site. Those who still wish to receive a paper edition are asked to pay a small subscription fee to cover costs.

The name of the newsletter changes every issue. Sometimes it involves a play on words that involves the name of the house somehow, sometimes there is a theme of sorts. The title of this particular issue intended to celebrate Tau's 30th anniversary of becoming Theta Sigma Tau in 1976. The double entendre of the name is just happy coincidence.

### Porch Party

These days at Ripon, the house celebrates the beginning of a new school year with First Party. Usually held before classes begin, First Party is just that,



the first party of the year. But, in the days before the administration became psychotic about security and enforcing meaningless rules and restrictions, First Party was known as Porch Party. On the autumn

day before classes began, we would haul our couches, chairs and tables out to the "porch", that lovely and stylish cement block servicing the East Mapes entrance. We were always very welcoming to folks wandering down into the quads (an excellent way to meet the usually bewildered frosh).

This had to come to an end, alas, because the college forbade students from bringing furniture outside of the building. Perhaps it is time to revive Porch Party. If the house were to purchase some cheap lawn chairs, perhaps a couple coolers, a grill, and a table or two (rummage sales would be perfect for finding all of these), they could again celebrate the return to Ripon, old style.

### Open Bar Party

The change in 1985 of the drinking age in Wisconsin from 19 to 21 sounded the death knell for parties like this one

Open Bar Party was a fall party that invited attendees to briefly take over the role of bartender. Each person who wished to could share their favorite recipe for a mixed drink with the rest of the



crowd. Or they could try making up something new. Of course, in these latter cases, many of the concoctions that resulted from drunken experimentation were vile to say the least.

Much of this "party" was done in a presentation & audience style, with the bartender of the moment showing off his or her recipe or creation (and bartending style or lack thereof) while the crowd looked on.

In the mid-80s the federal government began pressuring states to raise the legal age for drinking and Wisconsin capitulated in 1985, raising the drinking age to 21. The last Open-Bar Party was held in the fall of 1985, and it has been missed.

### Pledge Names

The tradition of Pledge Names at Tau is relatively new, considering the age of the house. In the past, members would often have a nickname of some sort, but the formal assignment of pledge names began with the pledge class that graduated in 1992.



The assignment of pledge names takes place at the meeting after Pref Party, when the house has a group of potential pledges to vote upon. Once all of the applicants are accepted or rejected, the first order of business is to assign


each of the pledge a big sister or brother. Following that comes the assignment of a pledge name.

Generally, pledge names are humorous nicknames that gently poke fun at the pledge. In some cases a pledge name might be determined, in part, by the lineage of the pledge. For example: there was a tradition in one of the branches of House Theta that there always be at least one active whose pledge name was that of a deity from some mythological tradition, the God Line of Theta. Another influence upon pledge names can be the spirit of wackiness infecting the membership that particular morning. For example, a recent pledge class were all awarded "Care Bear" pledge names: names that ended in "Bear." The pledges that semester also received hand colored Care Bear pictures for their dorm room doors.

Some pledge names are short and to the point, others are long, meandering, and drawn out (much like this sentence...). The shortest pledge name of an active or alum, to date, is Sully Sheahan's Ren (of Ren & Stimpy fame). The longest is Aimee Kucera's: Drinker of the Dirty Bong Water; aka: A Thick-Necked Woman named Gunta. That's quite the name to remember!

Pledge names make excellent fodder for Tau Trivia during Live-In Weekend. One can go easy on the pledge: "What is your big's pledge name?" Or, one can be cruel: "Name your family line back five generations by their pledge name!"

One might notice, in looking over the family trees, that alumni from the era prior to pledge names are often listed with a pledge name. If the alum had a well known nickname while they were at Ripon, that name has been unofficially pegged as their pledge name.



#### Sudoku - Easy


